Restorative Justice is . . .

- **Justice** that sees crime as a broken relationship between the offender, the victim, and the community.
- **Justice** that holds the offender accountable to the victims and communities they harm.
- **Justice** that restores and protects the victim and the community, while building individual and community skills to reduce the likelihood of future crime.

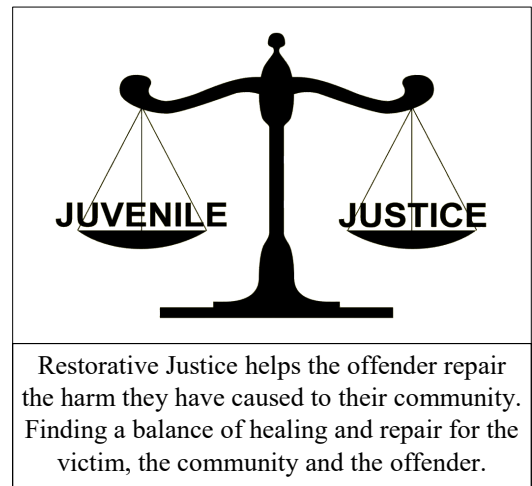
The Vision Of Restorative Justice . .

A justice system that is restorative serves three stakeholders:

- Victims
- Offenders
- Communities

A justice system that is restorative has three goals:

- Public Safety
- Offender Accountability
- Improved competencies in offenders and communities



What are Restorative Justice Panels and what is the purpose?

Restorative Justice Panels consist of community members who serve as volunteers to work with young offenders charged with minor offenses. Their purpose is not to judge, but to help and guide the juvenile as they repair the harm caused by the crime they committed. The primary purpose of the panel is to divert young people charged from the Juvenile Court back to their communities.
